One of our members Judyth Gregory-Smith will be travelling to Myanmar in October and would like to ask for your unwanted glasses. Below is a message from Judyth.

"On my last trip to Myanmar I visited villages far and wide: one at Mindat in the mountains of Chin State and another in the middle of the Ayeyarwady River - where it is three miles wide! Some of the old people had no (formal) education and could not read. They found the distance glasses helped them get around their village. Those who were weavers, tailors or plied other crafts found reading glasses improved their accuracy! One very smiley fisherman wanted to know how to say 'thank you very much in English' - so I pass his words on to you in advance!

I return to Myanmar in October and hope to take many more pre-loved glasses with me if you can spare them. I could collect these at the MCG events at the Islamic Arts Museum on the 21st or the lecture on The Alluring Cheongsam on the 28th September."

Thursday's child has far to go and I think I have. I started off in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada in 1944, on a Thursday in June. While my mother was obviously present my father, a Lieutenant in the Canadian Navy, was involved in the War effort in England, only returning when I was 10 months old. With the end of the War, he resumed his civilian life as a journalist with a news agency, Canadian Press (CP). Montreal was our next desti-

nation, where a brother was born and I started school. Subsequently CP moved us to New York, where we lived on Long Island (pronounced longailin locally) and I attended two New York schools. How cool to find that I only had to learn the words for 'My Country Tis' of Thee' as it had the same melody as 'God Save the Queen' which I already knew from school in Canada. After two years, CP next sent us to its head office in Toronto (trawna locally). Here a second brother was born and I finished elementary and high school at several more schools. For university I returned to Halifax to attend Dalhousie University, majoring in psychology and English. In 16 years of education, I had attended 12 schools.

At Dal, I met a handsome fellow among all the Malaysians who were so 'aksi' - showing off - on the badminton courts. I became an imported bride marrying Muri in 1968 in his kampong, Bentong, in Pahang, the first time either of us had been to a bersanding, the Malay wedding. It was apparent that teaching was a profession open to an OP (orang puteh - European) wife so I went along to an interview at Bukit Bintang Boys Secondary School in P.J. - Do you have any experience? No. Do you speak Malay? No. Are you a citizen? No. - Needless to say I wasn't holding my breath. One of

Muri's colleagues at ICI suggested that I try a new, small American school. So I went to an interview at the International School of Kuala Lumpur and was hired at the grand salary of RM 869 a month.

For many years I taught at ISKL's elementary grades. The Muri boys started arriving: Khalil in '73, Karim in '76 and Kamarul in '79. Muri made his way through the Department of Fisheries, ICI, KPM Niaga, finally ending up with Petronas in 1975 when there were only 60 employees. He found it exciting to set up the first Petronas gas station in 1979 selling diesel from skid tanks in Kepong after Prime Minister Hussein said he wanted diesel available to the country yesterday.

Middle School attracted me next and I taught Humanities for several years. After a spell, High School beckoned and I taught secondary English and IB. In 2002, Muri retired from Petronas as Vice President, Gas Business. And after 40 years at ISKL, I retired in 2008. Now I am truly blessed for I have nine grandchildren. Khalil lives in KL, Karim in Perth and Kamarul in San Diego. So with three sons on three continents, I feel that I still have far to go.
